

ART ALL NIGHT DRAWS RECORD CROWDS TO TENLEYTOWN

For the second year, Tenleytown Main Street joined neighborhoods across the city in hosting Art All Night: Made in DC on Saturday, September 23. The annual festival celebrates the visual and performing arts, highlighting the creative talents of District residents.

Nearly II,000 attendees took part in events in Tenleytown — more than double the number who attended in 2016. Wisconsin Avenue was filled with music, dance performances, and art lovers of all ages moving among Tenleytown's I4 art venues.

"Art All Night was incredible — congratulations on putting together an amazing experience! I have never seen so much activity and excitement in the neighborhood," said local resident Laura Ressler.

Festival-goers explored exhibits at Tenleytown shops, and filled restaurants as they enjoyed dining and drinking between Art All Night performances. The crowds led to increased sales and business leads, as well as strong brand exposure.

Tenleytown Main Street featured more than 70 artists and performance groups during the festival, drawing predominantly from the greater Tenleytown community, though artists from across the city were also represented. Art installations included photography, paintings, drawings, sculpture, mixed media, textiles, jewelry, and more.

In addition to exhibits and performances, Art All Night in Tenleytown offered ample opportunities for attendees to



interact with and create art of their own. Festival-goers took part in a dance flash mob, workshops on silk painting and Japanese paper lanterns, henna art, and craft projects for kids.



HAPPY ANNIVERSARY

Congratulations to District Taco, 4600 Wisconsin Ave, which celebrated its first anniversary in Tenleytown earlier this month. District Taco serves affordable Yucatan-influenced tacos and burritos, inspired by recipes from owner Osiris Hoil's mother.

WELCOME TO THE NEIGHBORHOOD

Yobi joined Tenleytown's growing dining scene in August, opening at 4629 41st Street. The restaurant offers fresh sushi in a casual environment, and has both indoor and outdoor seating.

Also in August, Orangetheory Fitness opened its second DC studio at Tenley View, 4600 Wisconsin Avenue. The nationwide exercise franchise offers 60-minute group interval training. The Tenleytown location is owned and operated by local residents Kerri and Marc Johnson.

Tenleytown Main Street welcomed Yobi, Orangetheory Fitness, and Muncheez, which opened in June, at a ribbon cutting ceremony on September 14. Councilmember Mary Cheh, as well as representatives of the Department of Small and Local Business Development and the Mayor's Office of Community Relations and Services, joined TMS in celebrating these businesses.

CONGRATULATIONS

Tenleytown Main Street also honored CommuniKids Preschool at a ceremony on September 14. The language immersion pre-school announced in August that it would offer free Pre-K 3 and Pre-K 4 to District residents. The classes are part of the Pre-K Enhancement and Expansion Funding program managed by the Office of the State Superintendent of Education.



NEIGHBOR FEATURE: Ace Hardware

When Hechinger's Hardware and Lumber Yard and the Sears Department Store closed in the 1990s, Tenleytown was left without a hardware store. Roadside Development bought the old Sears building at the corner of Wisconsin Avenue and Albemarle Street, adding three stories of condominiums to what is now Cityline at Tenley. Best Buy and the Container Store eventually moved into the space occupied by Sears, but Tenleytown still had no hardware store.

In 2006, Gina Schaefer, CEO of DC-based A Few Cool Hardware Stores, answered the neighborhood's plea and opened Tenleytown Ace Hardware in the lower level of the old Sears building — the third of 11 community hardware stores Schaefer has opened in the DC area.

At first it seemed that having the entrance through the parking garage would be a problem, but customers have managed to find the store — though manager Stephen Bolton does wish they had some space fronting Wisconsin Avenue for an attractive display of flowering plants.

Tenleytown Ace sells Benjamin Moore paint, electrical and plumbing supplies, tools, grills, outdoor furniture, garden supplies, kitchen items, and much more. Customers always get a friendly greeting from one of the store's 33 knowledgeable staff members who know just where to find any desired item.

Tenleytown Ace Hardware is a community store. It is an annual stop on the Yeti Scavenger Hunt during Tenley WinterFest and regularly supplies bags of mulch and tools for Tenleytown Main Street's beautification projects.
